CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

SENIOR SOX: Signed by the Red Sox on April 26, 1995, Wakefield enters his 14th season in Boston and is the active player with the longest continuous service in a Red Sox uniform...Only 3 other active major league pitchers have worn the same uniform continuously since at least 1995: John Smoltz of the Braves (1988), Trevor Hoffman of the Padres (1993) and Mariano Rivera of the Yankees (1995)...On April 19, 2005, Wake agreed to a contract extension through the 2006 season with club options thereafter...His 2008 option was exercised on November 2, 2007.

Wake joins Bob Stanley (1977-89) and Roger Clemens (1984-96) as having the longest continuous stints as a pitcher in franchise history...Carl Yastrzemski leads among all players with 23 straight seasons (1961-83).

CLIMBING THE CHARTS: With 1,680 strikeouts, ranks 3rd on the Red Sox all-time list, trailing only Roger Clemens (2,590) and Pedro Martinez (1,683)...With 154 wins as a Red Sox, is 3rd in club history...Only Clemens and Cy Young, both with 192, have more Sox wins...With 2,400.2 IP as a Red Sox, is 3rd on the club list behind Clemens (2776.0) and Young (2728.1)...Has made 337 starts as a Red Sox, 2nd in club history behind only Clemens (382)...Is 2nd in club history with 474 appearances, trailing only Bob Stanley (637).

Is one of only 11 active pitchers with 500 or more appearances and at least 350 starts...Has thrown 2,621.0 career major league innings, 12th-most among active pitchers.

154 AND COUNTING: Earned his 150th victory with the Red Sox on his 41st birthday, August 2, 2007 vs. Baltimore (3 ER/7.0 IP)...Is one of 3 active pitchers to record at least 150 wins with their current team, joining John Smoltz (207 with ATL) and Andy Pettitte (164 in 2 stints with NYY).

STARTING AND RELIEVING: Has pitched exclusively as a starter over the last 3 seasons and has made only 4 total relief appearances in the last 5 campaigns...Is 158-133 with a 4.40 ERA (1149 ER/2349.2 IP) in 370 career starts and 10-13 with 22 saves and a 3.75 ERA (113 ER/271.1 IP) in 141 career relief appearances.

AWARDS AND HONORS: Among the most community-minded players in the game, Wakefield has been honored as the Red Sox recipient of the Roberto Clemente Award 7 times, including a run of 6 straight years (1998, 2000-2005)...Wakefield's area of focus has been with the Franciscan Children's Hospital in Boston and the Space Coast Early Intervention Center in his hometown of Melbourne, FL.

The longest-tenured member of the Red Sox enjoyed one of his finest seasons in 2005, leading the club in wins, starts, innings pitched, strikeouts, complete games and opponents average by a

starter en route to being honored as the club's Pitcher of the Year by the Boston chapter of the BBWAA...Finished 16-12 with a 4.15 ERA in 33 starts...Ranked 8th in the American League and matched his career high with 17 wins in 2007.

POST-SEASON PERFORMER: Has appeared in 17 career playoff games (10 starts) over 8 different postseasons (1992, 1998-99, 2003-05, 2007), going 5-6 with 2 complete games, 2 games finished and a 6.36 ERA (49 ER/69.1 IP).

Was a late scratch from Boston's 2007 Division Series and World Series rosters due to inflammation behind his right shoulder...His lone post-season appearance was a start and loss in Game 4 of the ALCS at Cleveland on October 16...Allowed 5 runs on 5 hits over 4.2 innings, with all 5 runs coming in his final inning of work (5th)...Struck out 7 and walked 2.

Made 10 post-season outings (5 starts) for the Sox from 2003-05, going 3-3 with a 5.45 ERA (23 ER/38.0 IP)...Started Game 3 of Boston's 2005 American League Division Series against the White Sox, and allowed 4 runs on 6 hits in 5.1 innings en route to a 5-3 loss that gave Chicago a 3-game series sweep...In 2004, was 1-0 with a 9.82 ERA (12 ER/11.0 IP) in 4 games (one start)...Did not pitch in the 3-game sweep of Anaheim in the ALDS...Made 3 relief appearances in the ALCS vs. New York, going 1-0 with an 8.59 ERA (7 ER/7.1 IP)...In one of the key efforts of the series, saved the Sox pen with 3.1 innings of relief in the 19-8 Game 3 loss...In the process, sacrificed his scheduled Game 4 start...Earned the Game 5 win with 3.0 innings of one-hit shutout relief...Started Game 1 of the World Series at Fenway and did not figure in the decision, allowing 5 runs on 3 hits and 5 walks in 3.2 innings...In 2003, went 2-2 with a 2.91 ERA (7 ER/21.2 IP) in 5 post-season appearances (3 starts)...Was 0-1 with a 3.52 ERA (3 ER/7.2 IP) in 2 games (one start) in the ALDS vs. Oakland...Was 2-1 with a 2.57 ERA (4 ER/14.0 IP) in 3 games (2 starts) in the ALCS vs. New York...Started and won both Game 1 and Game 4, in both cases out-dueling Mike Mussina...Took the loss in relief in Game 7...After working a 1-2-3 10th, allowed a first-pitch home run to Aaron Boone leading off the bottom of the 11th, giving the Yankees a walk-off 6-5 win.

2007 HIGHLIGHTS

SUMMARY: Rebounded from an injury-plagued 2006 season to rank 8th in the American League with 17 wins in 2007, matching his career high set in 1998...At 41 years old, became just the 2nd Red Sox pitcher over the age of 40 to ever win at least 17 games in a season, joining Cy Young, who won 21 games in both 1907 and 1908...Made at least 30 starts for the 4th time in the last 5 seasons...Went 11-3 with a 4.12 ERA (41 ER/89.2 IP) over a 14-start stretch from June 12-August 25, leading the majors in wins in that span.

DECISIONS, DECISIONS: Earned a decision in each of his first 26 starts, the longest such streak in the majors since Jack McDowell did so in 27 straight starts for the White Sox to begin 1993 season...The last Sox pitcher to get a decision in at least his first 26 starts was Danny MacFayden (26) in 1929...Last Sox pitchers with longer such streaks were Red Ruffing (30) and Ed Morris (29), both in 1928...Club record is 43 by Cy Young in 1902...Wake's first no-decision of 2007 did not come until September 6 at Baltimore.

IN AWE OF HIS AUGUST: Was named the Red Sox Player of the Month for August after going 4-1 with a 2.45 ERA (9 ER/33.0 IP) in 5 starts...Completed the month with a scoreless streak of 22.0 innings over his final 3 starts (3-0), August 13-25.

RIDING THE WAVE: In his first 7 starts through May 10, went 4-3 with a 1.79 ERA (9 ER/45.1 IP), allowing as many as 3 runs in a start only twice...Followed that stretch by going 9-7 with a 6.22 ERA (67 ER/97.0 IP) in his next 16 starts through August 7...Tossed 22.0 consecutive scoreless innings to earn the win in each of his next 3 starts, allowing just 9 hits in that span...Closed the season by giving up 25 runs (24 earned) in 24.2 innings over his final 5 starts...Allowed one earned run or less in 11 of his 31 starts overall.

SUPPORT STORY: The Sox gave Wakefield 96 runs of support in his 17 wins, an average of 5.6 runs per game...However, Boston has scored just 19 runs while Tim was in the game in his 12 losses, an average of 1.6 runs per contest.

In his last 16 losses beginning June 15, 2006, the Red Sox have scored a total of 19 runs while Wakefield has been in the game, all coming in his 12 losses in 2007...In his last 23 losses dating to the start of 2006, Boston has scored a combined 25 runs while Wakefield was in, an average of 1.1 runs per game, including no runs 9 times and one run 8 times.

UNLUCKY NO. 3: Gave up 3 runs or more in an inning 15 times in 2007...51 of his 104 runs allowed (49 percent) came in those 15 innings.

INSIDE THE NUMBERS: Did not allow a home run in 7 consecutive starts from July 17-August 25, a span of 51.2 innings...Was 10-4 with a 5.27 ERA (55 ER/94.0 IP) in 15 starts at home and 7-8 with a 4.26 ERA (45 ER/95.0 IP) in 16 road starts...Fared better with increased rest, posting a 5.59 ERA

(52 ER/83.2 IP) in 14 starts on 4 days of rest, a 4.28 ERA (36 ER/75.2 IP) in 12 starts on 5 days of rest and a 3.64 ERA (12 ER/29.2 IP) in 5 starts on 6-plus days of rest.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

2006: Went 7-11 with a 4.63 ERA, limited to 23 starts due to just his 2nd career stint on the disabled list...landed on the disabled list from July 22-September 13 with a stress fracture in his rib cage, his first D.L. stay since missing only 15 days in 1997 due to right elbow inflammation...his 23 starts were his fewest appearances in a season since his rookie season of 1992 (13) with Pittsburgh while his 140.0 innings were his fewest since 1999 with the Red Sox (also 140.0).

2005: Was named Red Sox Pitcher of the Year by the Boston chapter of the BBWAA after leading the club in wins (16), starts (33), innings (225.1), strikeouts (151), complete games (3) and opponents average by a starter (.245)...finished 16-12 with a 4.15 ERA in 33 starts, pitching exclusively as a starter for the first time since 1996...Ranked among A.L. leaders in wins (tied for 5th with 16), starts (tied for 8th with 33), complete games (tied for 4th with 3), innings pitched (6th with 225.1) and strikeouts (11th with 151)...his .245 opponents average allowed was 6th-best in the A.L.

2004: Went 12-10 with a 4.87 ERA in 32 appearances (30 starts), the 2nd year in a row he made at least 30 starts...held opponents to a .264 average...threw all but 2.1 of his 188.1 innings to Doug Mirabelli...Jason Varitek caught the other 2.1 innings...allowed 19 unearned runs, tied with Bronson Arroyo and Kansas City's Brian Anderson for 3rd-most in the major leagues...in all of baseball, only teammate Derek Lowe (28) and Arizona's Brandon Webb (28) allowed more.

2003: Finished 11-7 with a save and a 4.09 ERA in 35 games (33 starts)...finished 2nd on the club with 202.1 innings pitched, one behind Derek Lowe...tied Lowe for team-high honors with 33 starts, matching his 1998 personal best...his .246 opponents average, career-best 169 strikeouts and 7.5 K's per 9 innings, trailed only Pedro Martinez among Sox starters...tied for 8th in the A.L. with 169 strikeouts and tied for 6th in the league with 7.5 K's per 9 innings...limited opponents to a .246 average, tied for 8th in the league...topped 200.0 innings for the 4th time (1996-1998)...threw all but 2.0 of his 202.1 regular-season innings with Doug Mirabelli behind the plate...August 3 at Baltimore, became the 9th pitcher to win 100 games as a Red Sox (Pedro Martinez later became the 10th).

2002: Enjoyed one of his finest seasons, finishing 11-5 with 3 saves and a 2.81 ERA in 45 games (15 starts)...struck out 134 and walked only 51 in 163.1 innings of work, an average of 7.38 K's and 2.81 walks per 9 innings...his 2.6-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio was a career best, as was his ratio of walks per 9 innings...ranked 2nd in the A.L. with a .204 opponents average and finished 4th in the A.L. in ERA...was 2nd in the league with 6.67 hits allowed per 9 innings and 4th with 7.38 K's per 9 innings...limited lefties to a .195 average (3rd in the A.L.) and righties to .214 mark (4th in the A.L.)...was the only pitcher in the league to place in the top 5 in each category, and--with Pedro Martinez--was one of only 2 in the top 10 in both...split the year between the rotation and the bullpen, entering the rotation to stay for his final 10 appearances beginning August 6...was 9-3 with a 2.39 ERA (26 ER/98.0 IP) in 15 starts and 2-2 with 3 saves and a 3.44 ERA (25 ER/65.1 IP) in 30 bullpen outings.

2001: At 9-12, finished with a sub-.500 record for the 3rd year in a row despite a 3.90 ERA in 45 games (17 starts)...ranked 7th in the A.L. with 7.9 K's per 9 innings...was 4-2 with 3 saves and a 3.24 ERA (23 ER/64.0 IP) in 26 relief outings and 5-9 with a 4.39 ERA (50 ER/104.2 IP) in 17 starts.

2000: Began the season in the bullpen and did not make a start until a no-decision May 11 in Baltimore, when he became the first Red Sox pitcher to start a game the day after appearing in relief since Vaughn Eshelman pitched in relief September 9, 1996 vs. Milwaukee and started against the Brewers the following day...made a pinch-hitting appearance, dropping down a sac bunt in the 11th inning June 28 vs. Baltimore...started the next night, becoming the first A.L. pitcher to pinch hit one day and start the next since Gene Nelson of the White Sox, who pinch hit at Cleveland on July 7, 1985 and started against the Indians the following day.

1999: Used primarily out of the bullpen for the first time in his career, Wakefield made 49 appearances, 32 in relief...finished the year 6-11 with a career-high 15 saves and a 5.08 ERA...was 1-2 with 15 saves and a 3.50 ERA (18 ER/46.1 IP) in 32 relief appearances...opened the year in the rotation, going 1-2 with an 8.01 ERA (19 ER/21.1 IP) in 5 starts, but was moved to the pen when Tom Gordon went on the D.L. on April 17...earned his first major league save with a scoreless 9th inning in a 3-2 win May 6 vs. Texas...returned to the rotation when Gordon was activated from the D.L.

1998: Went 17-8 with a 4.58 ERA in 36 games (33 starts)...established career highs with 17 wins, 216.1 innings pitched and 33 starts...dropped down a sacrifice bunt April 22 at Detroit, the first Red Sox pitcher to be used as a pinch hitter since Tim Lollar in game 2 of an August 12, 1986 doubleheader at Kansas City...had a career-best 10 wins at the All-Star break...was the Red Sox' nominee for Major League Baseball's Roberto Clemente Award and was named Red Sox Man of the Year by the BoSox Club.

1997: In his 3rd Red Sox season, finished 12-15 with a 4.25 ERA in 35 games (29 starts)...tied for the A.L. lead in losses...ranked 4th in the league with 4 complete games and tied for 3rd with 2 shutouts...averaged 6.75 K's per 9 innings, 9th-most in the A.L...was 10th in the league with 8.63 hits allowed per 9 innings...led the club with 201.1 innings pitched...led the club with 9 wins after the All-Star break, going 9-6 with a 3.71 ERA in 19 games (15 starts)...was on the D.L. April 23-May 6 with right elbow inflammation...threw 2.2 innings of relief July 4 at Chicago, his first relief appearance as a Red Sox and his first since June 28, 1993 with Pittsburgh at Montreal.

1996: Rebounded from going 0-3 with a 6.11 ERA in his first 3 starts (running his losing streak to 7 in a row dating to 1995) to finish 14-13 with a 5.14 ERA in 32 starts...equaled his 1995 career best with 6 complete games, 4th-most in the A.L...served up a career-high 38 home runs, 3rd-most in the A.L. and most ever by a Red Sox (Earl Wilson allowed 37 homers in 1964)...hurled back-to-back complete-game victories August 5 vs. Toronto and August 10 at Milwaukee, when he fanned 10 to match his career high...was rewarded with A.L. Player of the Week honors for the week of August 5-11...was 2-0 with a 1.50 ERA (3 ER/18.0 IP), walking 2 and striking out 18.

1995: Released by the Pirates during Spring Training, Wakefield signed a minor league contract with the Red Sox on April 27 and went on to finish 3rd in A.L. Cy Young voting behind only Randy Johnson and Jose Mesa...went 2-1 with a 2.52 ERA in 4 starts for the PawSox and had his contract purchased by the Red Sox May 27...went on to lead the club with 16 wins and a 2.95 ERA, 2nd in the A.L...started 14-1 before dropping 7 of his last 9 decisions...his 6 complete games tied for 4th in the league...was 2nd on the club with 27 starts and 195.1 innings pitched and 3rd with 119 strikeouts...held opponents to a .227 average, 4th in the A.L...June 4 vs. Seattle, threw a 10.0-inning complete game in his Fenway Park debut, throwing 134 pitches in a 2-1 win...before his own throwing error led to an unearned run in the 10th, had worked 22.1 consecutive scoreless innings...did not allow an earned run for 32.0 innings...won 10 consecutive starts June 29-August 13, the first Red Sox to turn that trick since Ellis Kinder won 13 straight in 1949...the last to win 10 straight decisions was Mike Boddicker in 1990...Roger Clemens won his first 14 decisions in 1986...the 10-game winning streak matched a run by Atlanta's Greg Maddux as the longest in baseball in 1995.

1994: Spent the entire season at Triple-A Buffalo, where he went 5-15 with a 5.84 ERA in 30 games, including a league-high 29 starts...ranked 4th in the American Association with 175.2 innings pitched...led the league in losses, walks (98) and homers allowed (27).

1993: Following a stellar rookie campaign, started the Pirates' season opener, earning a 9-4 win April 6 vs. San Diego...worked a career-high 10.0 innings-plus in a 6-2 win April 27 at Atlanta, becoming the first Pirate to hurl 10.0-plus innings since Rick Reuschel May 25, 1986...threw 172 pitches in the game, most by any major leaguer since Fernando Valenzuela threw 173 pitches August 30, 1987...after making his first 26 big league appearances as a starter, made his bullpen debut June 14 at St. Louis...threw a 4-hit shutout in a 5-0 win September 30 vs. Philadelphia in what would be his final Pirates appearance, becoming the first Pirate to toss back-to-back shutouts since Randy Tomlin in 1991...hit his only big league homer July 7 at Houston off Mark Portugal.

1992: Opened the season at Triple-A Buffalo and by the end of the season was a post-season hero and *The Sporting News* National League Rookie Pitcher of the Year...between Buffalo and Pittsburgh, finished 20-4 with a 2.71 ERA and 12 complete games in 35 regular season and post-season starts...called up by the Pirates on July 31, went the distance to win his major league debut that night, earning a 3-2 win vs. St. Louis...allowed 2 unearned runs on 6 hits in 9.0 innings, walking 5 and fanning 10...worked at least 8.0 innings in each of his first 4 starts with the Pirates, opening 3-0 with a 1.32 ERA (5 ER/34.0 IP) before suffering his lone big league loss of 1992 August 21 at San Francisco...threw his first career shutout August 26 at Los Angeles...went on to win both of his NLCS starts vs. Atlanta with a pair of complete-game efforts.

1991: Led Pirates minor leaguers in wins (15), innings (187.2) and complete games (8), going 15-8

with a 2.90 ERA in 26 games (25 starts) for Double-A Carolina and 0-1 with an 11.57 ERA in one start for Triple-A Buffalo.

1990: In his first full season as a pitcher, went 10-14 with a 4.73 ERA in a Carolina League-leading 28 starts for Single-A Salem...threw 2 complete games and worked a league-high 190.1 innings.

1989: Opened the season with Single-A Augusta, where he played 6 games at third base and 2 at first...hit .235 with 5 RBI in 11 games before being sent to short-season Single-A Welland, where he was converted into a pitcher...went 1-1 with 2 saves and a 3.40 ERA on 18 games (one start).

1988: Made his professional debut with Watertown of the short-season Single-A New York-Penn League, where he played 54 games as a first baseman and hit .189 with 3 homers and 20 RBI.

PERSONAL

Tim and his wife Stacy have two children and make their off-season home in Tim's hometown of Melbourne, FL...Tim attended Florida Tech in Melbourne, and was named Panthers team MVP as a first baseman as a sophomore in 1987 and as a junior in 1988...holds the school record with 40 career home runs, and in 1987 set single-season school records with 22 homers and 71 RBI...was the first Florida Tech player to be drafted, and, in February of 2006, had his number 3 retired by the school...Tim was inducted into the Sunshine State Conference Hall of Fame on February 25, 1998 and was named to the conference's Silver Anniversary team in 2002...graduated from Eau Gallie High School in Melbourne, FL in 1984.

TIM IN THE COMMUNITY: The Wakefield Warriors program, which Tim created in 1998, continues to enable patients from the Franciscan Hospital for Children to watch batting practice and visit with Tim before all Tuesday home games...for his dedication to improving the lives of children and their families in the Boston community, was honored by the Franciscan Hospital with their Community Leadership Award on May 22, 2003...Tim also generously contributes his time and financial resources to his hometown of Melbourne, FL...since Tim reached the major leagues, he has been committed to raising money and awareness for the Space Coast Early Intervention Center, a not-for-profit pre-school and therapeutic center which offers care for children with special needs as well as typically developing children...Tim is also actively involved as a generous contributor to Garth Brooks' Teammates for Kids Foundation...for his continued commitment to others, Wake has been nominated by the Red Sox for the Roberto Clemente Award 7 times, including 6 straight years (1998, 2000-2005).

In 2007, Tim also participated in the Southwest Florida Children's Hospital Celebrity Golf Classic; Met with Jimmy Fund patients as part of their trip to Spring Training; Attended the Welcome Home Dinner to benefit the Red Sox Foundation; Co-hosted the Pitching in for Kids Charity Golf Tournament and Kickoff party with Jason Varitek; Met with children as part of the Make-A-Wish program during the season; Met with Jimmy Fund patients as part of their road trip to Detroit; And attended Picnic in the Park to benefit the Red Sox Foundation.
